

From the President

A happy Frühling to you all after the winter that never was.

Actually, not having the opportunity to risk my bones and go skiing, I felt right at home because it was very much like a Canberran winter.

Although it is only March, the political climate back home is about as warm as the summer heat with a Federal election looming. The election is likely to be called late in the year, possibly October or November, but with a change in leadership for the Labor Party and the war in Iraqi pulling Prime Minister Howard down in the polls, it looks as though it is going to be a close run match.

If you are enrolled in Australia, are you ready to vote? As I say, it's still a long way off but when an election is called the electoral rolls close very quickly and often catch some people by surprise. And so you need to check well in advance that your enrolment is up to date.

There are many questions and answers that people might ask when an election draws near. For instance,

Question: Is it compulsory to be on the electoral roll if I am overseas?

Answer: Enrolment and voting by people outside Australia is not compulsory. However, if you are enrolled and you do not vote, or apply for a postal vote at a federal election, your electoral enrolment may be cancelled. Whether you are going overseas for either a short or long period of time you should let the AEC know that you will be away from your enrolled address. If you don't you run the risk of having your name removed from the roll.

Question: I am going overseas for up to a year, what should I do?

Answer: If you are going overseas for a short period of time and you will be returning to your address in Australia, you should let the AEC know by completing and submitting an [Overseas Notification form](#).

Questions: I am going overseas for a year or more, what should I do?

Answer: If you are going overseas permanently or indefinitely you must complete and submit an [Overseas Notification form](#).

This will remove you from the roll. If you are going overseas for more than one year and less than six you can choose to remain on the roll by [registering as an overseas elector](#) or you can ask to be removed from the roll in your absence by completing an [Overseas Notification form](#).

There are many more questions and they and the answers can be found on the Australian Electoral Commission's website at: www.aec.gov.au. You will also find the forms you might need to complete.

OzCon will provide more information as the election draws closer.

An Austrian Didgeridoo Player!



"Blowing the Didgeridoo means being connected to mother earth playing the sound of the universe"
Heinz Koisser

I would like to introduce you to Heinz Koisser an Austrian Didgeridoo player. I contacted Heinz and asked him a number of questions about his interest in the Didgeridoo and how he became involved.

Heinz was born in Lower Austria and lives in Knottingbrunn. His first encounter with the Didgeridoo was through friends in Sydney. It was a Midnight Oil unplugged concert in a pub with Adam Plack playing the Didgeridoo to the song "How can we dance when the earth is turning". This inspired Heinz to order his first Didgeridoo. His friend's answer to his request was "Hey you bloody tourist, you'll never learn to play the Didgeridoo. You need cheeks like Dana Gillespie, lips like Mick Jagger and a nose like a shotgun"! Not deterred by this Heinz got his first Didgeridoo and took hours of lessons from his friend Otto Trapp.

Heinz's inspiration to play the Didgeridoo came about in 1996 when he took an interest in world religions and ancient cultures. He encountered the Chronicle of the Dreamtime stories. Fascinated with their vision and meaning of life he started to collect poems at schools whenever Australia was on the agenda. During his travels downunder he visited various holy sites and met famous Didgeridoo players, Alan Dargin and Charlie "Hook" McMahon, who gave him some valuable hints and tips.

Heinz plays his Didgeridoo with deep respect for the Aboriginal people. He feels it's an honour for him to play the oldest wind instrument on the planet. The Didgeridoo is not made by human hands, rather the great power of nature - termites!

He feels it's his mission to educate his culture about the oldest indigenous tribe. When his children were babies he would tuck them into bed with the vibration of the Didgeridoo. After hours of playing he feels completely relaxed and has a big smile on his face! Heinz has produced a DVD of a live outdoor concert in the woods in Niederoesterreich. I asked Heinz how this concert came about?

The main idea of the concept came into being at the turn of the millennium. The story is about the Aboriginal – Walkabout through the outback in search of their ancestry. From the beginning of Dreamtime until today. The musicians in the group Walkabout, consist of professionals with their own production environments. Otto Trapp and Benno Sterzer have more than 25 years experience in world music. Michael Landl played keyboard in rock, blues and punk bands. Walkabout has been played and performed on several occasions. For further information check out the following websites:

When I asked Heinz to explain how to play the Didgeridoo, this was his reply.

Vibrating lips produce the tone of a standing wave deep into your body. Your cheeks form a kind of air reservoir (used for the circular briefing technique). The tongue gives the beat and makes the sound modulation. The voice accents your playing, like an animal crying, or talking and gives the tone more harmony. The diaphragm gives the pressure (like an air pillar). It also affects the standing wave in the form of a sinus modulation. Circular briefing is needed for a continued sound. You suck the air through your nose, close your soft palate and squeeze your cheeks all at the same time. This empties your air reservoir and enables the sound to exist.

Frey Wille in Australia Soon

It's colourful, unique, classy and available worldwide. It is Frey Wille jewellery and some lucky OzCon members saw how it is made.

Being school holidays for some, children as well as adults visited the Frey Wille headquarters in the 6th District on 23 February. We were given a tour of the factory and told the history of this unique Austrian company which began in 1951 and now has 40 shops around the world, with one expected to open in Australia this year.



Each piece of jewellery needs many firings at 600 degrees C as it is made.

The headquarters in Gumpendorferstrasse houses 140 of the company's 200 employees. Nine of them are designers, all women.

Each design, such as the best-selling Hundertwasser and Klimt collections, are produced for at least 10 years so that collectors can buy individual pieces over a period of time. Each collection includes bangles, pendants, rings and earrings. There are some discontinued lines where pieces can be purchased at a 30 per cent discount.

There is an exclusive men's collection which includes a belt buckle, tie pin and cuff links under development.

And we were all given one tip by the shop development manager Sandra Hubmann – it is cheaper to buy here in Austria than anywhere else in the world, including duty free.

Slow Roasted Chicken with Garlic, Thyme & Lemon

Serves 4-6

1 chicken cut into 10 pieces, or 8-10 chicken Maryland's
1 head of garlic separated into unpeeled cloves
Handful of fresh thyme, use dried if fresh unavailable
Plentiful glug of good olive oil
2 unwaxed lemons cut into chunky eights
150ml of white wine
Fresh black pepper and salt to taste

The secret of this recipe is the slow roasting. It is one of those recipes you can't make just once, that's to say, after the first time you're hooked.

Preheat the oven to 160°C. Put the chicken pieces into a roasting pan and add the garlic cloves, lemon chunks and the thyme. Add the oil, pepper and salt and use your hands to mix everything together. Make sure the chicken pieces are skin side up. Sprinkle over the white wine and cover with foil and put into the oven to cook, at flavour-intensifying low heat for 2 hours. Remove the foil from the roasting pan and turn up the oven to 200°C. Cook the uncovered chicken for another 30-45 minutes, by which time the skin will have turned golden brown.

I like to serve the chicken with **Garlic & Horseradish Mashed Potatoes**. Simply boil up the spuds until tender. Mash with a good helping of butter, freshly pressed garlic and a good teaspoon of horseradish and milk to form the consistency that you want. A trick to mashed spuds is to run a fork through them after mashing to circulate air into them and make them even more smooth and creamy.
Mahlzeit!!

Aussie news briefs

27 Feb. - **PRIME Minister John Howard** said today Melbourne businessman Ron Walker told him last year about his plan to start a nuclear energy company. But Mr Howard denies that Mr Walker or fellow businessmen Hugh Morgan and Robert Champion de Crespigny - his associates at Australian Nuclear Energy Pty Ltd - had told him of any proposals for a nuclear power plant in Australia. News Limited newspapers today said that some of Australia's richest men, including Ron Walker, Hugh Morgan and Robert Champion de Crespigny, were involved in a company that has raised the prospect of building a nuclear power plant. (Australian)

24 Feb. - **THE United States** left open the possibility of a military strike against Iran today as Australia warned of the "nightmare scenario" of Iran becoming emboldened by any coalition defeat in Iraq. "All options are still on the table," US vice president Dick Cheney told a joint news conference with Australian Prime Minister John Howard in Sydney today. (Sydney Morning Herald)

24 Feb. - **LOW rainfall on Waiheke Island** has led to a new crime - water thefts. The contents of Waiheke Kindergarten's big tanks have been stolen four times this year and on Thursday an Ostend resident reported a full 10,000-litre tank being drained overnight. (NZ Herald)

20 Feb. - **All the standard light globes in Australia will be replaced** with energy-efficient bulbs within three years under a radical Federal Government plan to cut back greenhouse emissions. In a world-first, the Government will announce today that it will phase out the general incandescent light bulbs by 2009-10, which could save as much as 800,000 tonnes of greenhouse gas pollution annually. Residents and businesses will be told to convert from the inefficient globes to alternatives such as compact fluorescent lights. (Canberra Times)

19 Feb. - **AUSTRALIA will send up to 70 military instructors to Iraq** within a few months, Prime Minister John Howard has confirmed. The additional military trainers would be sent to boost the skills of the Iraqi military and police, Mr Howard told journalists in Perth today. (Australian)

19 Feb. - **THE NSW election** on March 24 will return the Iemma Government to office - but it will be a very uncomfortable victory. In March 2003, Labor won 55 seats while all the rest had 38 - an absolute majority of 17 seats. On my predictions, Labor will have 47 seats in the next parliament, a loss of eight, while the rest will have 46. That would give Labor an absolute majority in the lower house of just a single seat. (Malcolm Mackerras in Australian)

19 Feb. - **QUEENSLAND** has launched an 11th-hour bid to wrest control of John Howard's \$10 billion water package with an audacious plan to replenish the Murray-Darling river system by piping water from the far north. Queensland Premier Peter Beattie called yesterday for nation-building projects that encourage inland development, not curtail it, in a move that places Canberra's river takeover in fresh doubt. In a plan partly inspired by work done in the 1930s by John Bradfield, the engineer who designed the Sydney Harbour and Brisbane's Story bridges, Mr Beattie would divert an extra two million megalitres of water each year from northern Queensland and northern NSW into the Murray-Darling system. (Australian)

16 Feb. - **A German paraglider** is being hailed as "the luckiest woman in the world" after surviving a violent storm cell that sucked her higher than Mount Everest during a flight over northern NSW. Ewa Wisnierska, 35, spent 40 minutes unconscious while being carried to a height of about 9,946 metres, where she was pounded by hail, narrowly avoided lightning and was covered in ice. A 40-year-old Chinese paraglider sucked into the same storm cell was found dead yesterday, a day after going missing. (West Australian)

15 Feb. - **OPPOSITION Leader Kevin Rudd** has for the first time spelt out his preferred strategy for an American military withdrawal from Iraq, adding to pressure on Prime Minister John Howard as the two leaders battle for ascendancy on the issue. Mr Rudd, having previously declined to be drawn on what policy the US should adopt, said a staged withdrawal was the best way to ensure Iraq did not turn into a strategic defeat for Washington. There is now a parallel political divide in Australia and America, with Mr Rudd sharing the position of many Democrats in the US urging staged withdrawal, and Mr Howard dug in behind President George Bush. (Age)

13 Feb. - **LATE summer rain** in three states has settled the dust, raised spirits and even lifted dam levels, but authorities say more is needed to break the drought. A persistent trough over the inland and three days of onshore winds delivered rain to parts of the parched Gippsland region, southeast Queensland and coastal NSW. NSW Primary Industries Minister Ian MacDonald said falls in the state's central west and south were heartening and would provide "some relief for farmers and revitalise paddocks". (Australian)

11 Feb. - **CANBERRA home owners** are sitting on a gold mine, with property prices rising 200 per cent on average in the past decade and by much more in newer suburbs. Figures obtained by the Canberra Sunday Times show median house prices in the established suburbs such as Garran in the south, and Ainslie in the north, have increased between 150 and 200 per cent, especially in the past couple of years. (Canberra Times)

11 Feb. - **DROUGHT-PROOFING** Australia and solving the water crisis are bigger election issues than climate change, Prime Minister John Howard says in an interview with the Sydney Morning Herald. Mr Howard set the scene for the election year by nominating the home-based issues of economic prosperity, national security and "self-contained" Australian environmental issues as the keys to a fifth successive victory. (Sydney Morning Herald)

9 Feb. - **THE massive increase in employment** over the past three months has cut the jobless rate to a 32-year low of 4.5 per cent - and the continuing flow of job advertisements suggests it could fall even lower. Peter Costello claimed the Government's industrial relations policy had contributed to the creation of 300,000 jobs since its introduction last year. "All those people who said they were against Work Choices because it would cost people jobs were wrong," the Treasurer said. (Australian)
